PROJECT PROGRESS REPORT



WHAT'S NEW?

- Bray and the District Core Planning Team (CPT) have continued to meet bi-weekly.
- Bray, C.D. Smith Construction, and the District have begun meeting regularly with the City of Columbus to work through the details of permitting on the elementary school site.
- The final round of elementary and high school subcommittee meetings were held on December 16. These meetings were an opportunity to keep staff informed of design development and seek their feedback.

WHAT'S NEXT?

- Bray and the District will present to the City of Columbus Plan Commission in January. They will be seeking approval of a Certified Survey Map (CSM) for the elementary school site.
- Environmental branding design and furniture selection will continue through the upcoming months.

PLANNING + DESIGN UPDATE

- The full architecture, engineering, and construction team met with the District for a coordination meeting on December 14. These meetings occur at regular intervals throughout the project.
- The first furniture planning meetings held with the Core Planning Team (CPT) reviewed the District's furniture needs. Future meetings will move toward selecting furniture pieces. There is also an ongoing effort to select existing furniture in good condition to save and reuse.

The Bray team made a preliminary presentation to the City of Columbus Plan Commission in preparation for their January presentation.

The Bray team and engineering consultants completed a 75% progress set of construction documents (plan drawings) on December 18. This will be used for budgeting and coordination with C.D. Smith Construction.

News from the Nurse, Brittany Bayer, RN

Hello families,

We are so excited to welcome students back into the building on January 19th. Here are a few COVID reminders/updates for you as we prepare to return to in-person learning.

- 1. Please screen your child(ren) for symptoms prior to coming to school each day and keep them home if they are not feeling well.
- 2. We will continue to use the same protocol for excluding symptomatic students as before. If your child(ren) is showing symptoms consistent with COVID-19 such as shortness of breath/difficulty breathing, loss of taste or smell, cough, fever or chills, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, congestion or runny nose, fatigue, muscle or body aches, and/or sore throat, please keep them home and contact myself or your healthcare provider for further guidance. As always, we are more than happy to provide you with assistance in determining when it is safe for them to return to school.
- 3. Those who have been tested for COVID-19 should remain home while waiting for the results. Students who test positive for COVID-19 may return to school once it has been 10 days since symptoms onset, they have been fever-free for 24-hours without the use of medication, and all other symptoms have improved.
- 4. If your child is identified as a close contact, they will need to remain out of school and from participating in any extracurricular activities for 14 days since they were last exposed to the confirmed positive case. We will not be shortening the quarantine period for asymptomatic close contacts as best practice is to remain quarantined for the full 14 days.
- 5. We recognize that some students who are 16 years and older may be eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccination. Currently, there is not enough evidence to suggest that those who have been vaccinated do not need to follow the other mitigation measures. Those who have gotten the vaccine will still need to wear a mask, maintain social distancing, wash hands, and follow quarantine/isolation guidelines. This means that even those who have been vaccinated will need to quarantine for 14 days if they are identified as a close contact, and/or isolate if they begin to show symptoms of COVID-19.

Landmark Service Cooperative Donation helps students access online learning.

Landmark Service Cooperative announced that its pilot program with the Columbus School District successfully came to a close, resulting in a donation of \$3,271 to the District.

From September 1 through November 30, 2020, the Landmark Cenex convenience store in Columbus donated 5% of all sales generated inside the store and 5 cents per gallon of gas purchased when customers shopped using their Landmark Rewards Program cards.

This donation helped the District invest in Wi-Fi hotspots, which gave more District students a reliable mechanism for accessing online learning.

Curriculum & Instruction January Updates-Focus: Academic Support and Feedback Opportunity For Families

January Parent/Guardian Survey

Important open enrollment dates

February 1 – April 30, 2021 – Parents must submit applications online or directly to the nonresident school district.

June 11, 2021 – Nonresident school districts must send notices of approval or denial via US mail or email. If the application is approved, the school district must notify the parents of the specific school or program to which the pupil is assigned. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 18, 2021 – Resident districts must notify applicants if the application is denied. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 25, 2021 — Parents of accepted applicants must notify the nonresident district if the pupil will attend the nonresident district in the 2021-22 school year. If the parent fails to make this notification, the nonresident district may refuse to allow the pupil to attend the district.

Dane County Youth Assessment

Columbus School District will be participating in the Dane County Youth Assessment this year. We will be assessing students in grades 3-12 between February 15th and March 15th. Surveying our students is more important this year given the prolonged pandemic and the concerns about the impact on student well-being and mental health.

The Dane County Youth Assessment has been used to inform the following community efforts:

- School districts throughout the county use the data in classroom discussions, to track youth trends and to add counseling resources to assess student mental health needs.
- Dane County Human Services expanded mental health support to community centers.
- The Dane County Homeless Coalition launched a homeless shelter for youth.
- United Way of Dane County developed the Achievement Connections initiative with partner school districts to improve high school achievement and graduation rates.
- The City of Madison uses the data to set funding priorities and launched an Out of School Time service initiative.
- Dane County uses the data to inform resource allocation and funding priorities.

The survey will be conducted in the Columbus Intermediate, Middle and High Schools between February 15, 2021 and March 15, 2021. The survey will be administered electronically. No one in the school or district will see any individual student responses. Parents may review the survey in a hard copy form at the offices of CHS and CIS/CMS or by contacting the building principal. If you prefer your son or daughter no participate, you may opt them out of participating by contacting <u>Lisa Blochwitz</u> at <u>lblochwitz@columbus.k12.wi.us</u>.


Materials Pick-up

Food Service News, Laura Austin, Director of Food Service

Dear Families of the Columbus School District:

First, the Columbus Food Services Team would like to thank you for allowing us to feed your students during these unprecedented times. I am sharing the plan to continue to make meals available for the students and youth of Columbus.

- Meal delivery will continue through Friday, January 15th with bus delivery and pick-up at the Middle School.
- There will be NO meals available on Monday, January 18th

Meal service will resume on Tuesday, January 19th with a few changes:

- Breakfasts and lunches will still be available at NO CHARGE at each school for in-person learning days
- Milk Breaks will continue for K-5 throughout each day. There is a 50 cent charge for milk unless a family receives Free/Reduced meals
- Ala carte items will continue to be charged at regular costs (milk with a meal brought from home, additional items at CHS, etc.)
- Food Service will continue safe serving practices and allowing for social distancing during meal times
- Students in grades 3-12 will still need to have their SCHOOL ID with them to pay for their meals. We will be using a scanning system to decrease touch points at the cash registers and breakfast carts

<u>Virtual Learning Days and Virtual Learners:</u>

- Food Services will continue with the online preordering system through the Parent Portal of Infinite Campus.
- Parents will be able to preorder any breakfast or lunch for any student grades K-12.
- Meals will be available for curbside pick-up at ONLY the MIDDLE SCHOOL from 7-8 am each day that school is in session (There will no longer be pick-up at CES or CHS, please come to Middle School now)
- Meals can be preordered for pick-up up to 2 weeks in advance so that parents do not need to go into the system to order every day.
- **NOTE: ALL MEALS must be ordered by 8 AM of the previous school day and by 8 AM on Friday for the following Monday.
